JIS/JIC PLANNING FOR TRIBAL, STATE, AND LOCAL PIOs (G-291)

Description

As an incident expands in complexity, often multiple agencies, departments and jurisdictions may be integrated into incident management activities both at the command and coordination levels. In a multi-agency response, several Public Information Officers (PIOs) may be assigned to the incident, requiring increased coordination. The purpose of this course is to equip PIOs with the skills needed to establish and organize a Joint Information System (JIS) / Joint Information Center (JIC). This training will impart a working knowledge of operational practices for performing PIO duties within the National Incident Management System (NIMS) multiagency coordination system.

Topics & Issues to be Covered

- The JIS Approach to Managing Information
- Organizing and Leading a Local JIC
- Integrating with State and Federal Partners

Prerequisites

Successful completion of both the Public Information Officer Awareness (G-289) and Basic PIO (G-290) courses.

Suggested

To promote understanding of HSPD-5/NIMS requirements and the role of the PIO and the Joint Information System in the Incident Command System, we *strongly encourage* participants to complete both the IS-700, an Introduction to the National Incident Management System, and the IS-100, Introduction to the Incident Command System.

Who Should Attend

The primary audience for this training is individuals who have public information responsibilities as their main job or as an auxiliary function at the State, tribal or local level of government.
